1. APPLICATION PROCEDURE

UW System application is required for admission to the university, along with high school and all college transcripts, and the application fee.

Application to the upper division business courses is accomplished during the required orientation meeting.

2. NON-COURSE REQUIREMENTS FOR ENTRANCE INTO UPPER-DIVISION COLLEGE OF BUSINESS AND ECONOMICS COURSES

Students are eligible to enroll in lower division business courses after completing 24 credits with at least a 2.5 grade point average. Admission to the upper-division courses in the College of Business and Economics requires completion of 54 credits, including the pre-requisite core (below), and a grade point average of 2.80.

3. COURSE REQUIREMENTS FOR ENTRANCE INTO UPPER-DIVISION COLLEGE OF BUSINESS AND ECONOMICS COURSES

To be admitted to register for the upper-division courses in the College of Business and Economics (COBE), students must complete 54 credits and satisfactorily complete or be enrolled in the required business core courses. Some of these may be completed at MATC and are listed below:

- 101-111 and 113 Accounting 1 and 2
- 101-118 Management Accounting (for all COBE majors excepting accounting majors) , **OR**
- 101-121 Intermediate Accounting (only for accounting majors)
- 809-211 Macroeconomics
- 809-212 Microeconomics
- 804-220 Finite Mathematics (Note: 804-231 Calculus I may be substituted for finite mathematics)
- 804-240 Basic Statistics
- 801-201 and 801-202 English 1 and 2
- 810-201 Speech Composition

4. COURSES REQUIRED FOR ADMISSION NOT IN MATC CURRICULUM

- ITSCM 280 Introduction to Information Systems

5. GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

As a general rule, students should earn the Associate of Arts or Associate of Science Degree, since it will satisfy all proficiency, core and breadth requirements at UW-Whitewater. This policy does NOT apply to the Associate of Applied Science (AAS) Degree. See an advisor for help on sequencing School of Business and Economics lower division courses into the Associate Degree program.

Students should consult the Transfer Information System (TIS) to learn equivalent courses (www.uwsa.edu/tis/)

Students who transfer to UW-Whitewater without the Associate Degree will be held for general education requirements.

Transfer students without the Associate of Arts or Associate of Science Degree may satisfy these requirements according to the scheme listed below.

<u>Credits transferred</u>	<u>Student must complete</u>
0-20	All Gen. Ed. Core courses
21-33	Two Core courses (including GENED 390)
40 or more	GENED 390 only
Earned Associate Degree	None (All Core Courses satisfied)

6. SPECIAL NOTES

- Maximum credits transferable toward degree completion from any 2-year college is 72.
- Students should only take elective courses on a Satisfactory/ Unsatisfactory (pass/fail) basis.
- International Requirement: this is a requirement for **graduation** from UW Whitewater's College of Business and Economics that may be satisfied by taking the following at MATC: SOCSCI 809-280 Anthropology. You may easily complete this requirement upon transfer to Whitewater.
- College Volunteer Requirement. Students are required to complete 20 hours of volunteer work prior to graduation. Verification of this requirement is required.
