Recreation Therapist

What is a Recreation Therapist? A Recreation Therapist is a professional who plans, directs, and coordinates recreation-based treatment programs for people with disabilities, injuries, or illnesses. Recreation therapists help people recover basic physical and mental abilities; build confidence; reduce depression, stress, and anxiety; and socialize effectively. They use recreational activities to help their patients. For example, a recreation therapist may help a patient who is paralyzed on one side of their body by teaching them to adapt activities, such as casting a fishing rod, to use their functional side. To help a patient develop social and coping skills and manage depression and anxiety, a recreation therapist may introduce a therapy dog. Recreation therapists may work with physicians and surgeons, registered nurses, psychologists, social workers, physical therapists, teachers, or occupational therapists.

Can UWW help me become a licensed Recreational Therapist? Absolutely! Although we do not have an accredited program in Recreation Therapy, we can help you prepare for licensure or qualify for a Masters program.

To Qualify for National Council for Therapeutic Recreation Certification (NCTRC) Licensure students must meet two prerequisites: <u>coursework</u> and <u>work experience</u>. Graduates who have met the prerequisites are eligible to write the Certified Therapeutic Recreation Specialist (CTRS) licensure exam.

<u>Coursework:</u> The eligibility requirements to take the CTRS examination are a baccalaureate degree or higher from an accredited college that includes the following coursework:

1. 18 CH of therapeutic recreation and general recreation content coursework with no less than 15 CH in therapeutic recreation content. A minimum of 5 courses in therapeutic recreation is required and each course must be a minimum of 3 CH.

<u>Work Experience</u> (must include direct client services): A minimum of 1 year full-time, paid work experience in therapeutic recreation services under the supervision of a CTRS that uses the therapeutic recreation process as defined by the current NCTRC Job Analysis.

Taking the NCTRC exam: The exam is based on the NCTRC Job Analysis of the Certified Therapeutic Recreation Specialist. Once NCTRC has reviewed your application, you can schedule an exam which is administered at Prometric Testing Centers across the U.S., Canada, and Puerto Rico. The NCTRC Exam is offered six times throughout the year with a two-week testing window for each administration.
