COEPS Digital Media and Learning Certificate*

The COEPS Digital Media and Learning Certificate is an experience for students who seek to become resourceful, creative, and critical users of technology in their professional lives. The certificate uses curricular and co-curricular activities to enhance knowledge, develop skills, and explore larger societal and philosophical issues tied to technologies. Students become active participants with a voice in their own learning as they develop 21st century learning and innovation skills. Growth is assessed through an e-Portfolio based on practical application of skills learned.

The certificate can provide a competitive advantage for students as they enter the workforce by developing advanced technology skills, encouraging in-depth exploration of technology-related topics, and examining the implications of technology-related decisions on learning, teaching, and the workplace. Students are encouraged to try new experiences, participate in reflective assessment, and think with an open mind.

Learning Outcomes

- Demonstrate the ability to plan one's own learning path to meet personal goals.
- Develop skills representative of a resourceful, critical, creative, and innovative user of technology in a global and digital society.
- Demonstrate critical use of technology with an awareness of what works and why to support different models of professional, educational and clinical practice
- Develop professional skills, model lifelong learning, and exhibit leadership by promoting and demonstrating the effective use of digital tools and resources.
- Use knowledge of content and technology to facilitate experiences that advance learning, organizational practices, creativity and innovation in both face-to-face and virtual environments.
- Design, develop, and evaluate authentic learning experiences and assessments incorporating contemporary tools and resources to maximize content learning.
- Identify local and global societal issues and responsibilities in an evolving digital culture.
- Identify and apply legal and ethical behavior in professional, educational and clinical settings.

Certificate Requirements

To complete the certificate in Digital Media and Learning COEPS, students must complete the <u>5 steps</u> outlined below:

- 1) Develop a <u>personalized plan</u> for meeting the program's digital media and learning goals based on self-assessment and reflection in collaboration with the coordinator.
- 2) Attend <u>4 or 5 group meetings and/or program events</u> of the Digital Media and Learning Certificate Program each semester to develop projects, share progress, and participate in a professional learning community.

- 3) Take <u>9 credits</u> of technology-related coursework with a C or better *from any combination* of the following:
 - A) Complete approved courses:
 - LIBMEDIA 434: Digital Tools for Learning
 - LIBST 350 Technology and social responsibility (This is a new course)
 - B) Complete special course section designated with the "DML" emphasis

 Examples of potential courses *could* include (and must be pre-approved by the Certificate Coordinator):
 - ELEMMID / SECNDED 472: Middle Level Stem Methods Applying Modeling Inquiry & Design
 - SPECED 476: Curriculum, Methods & Materials for those with Multi Disabilities
 - EDFNDPRC 210: Introduction to Education and Teaching
 - EDFOUND 243: Foundations of Education in a Pluralistic Society
 - C) Fulfill a "DML-option" contract to have a "DML" emphasis added to any course through the completion of a related, individually designed project. The intent to design a project must be approved by the instructor. The project itself will be developed under the direction and supervision of the Certificate Coordinator.
 - D) Other courses containing significant technology and/or digital media components as approved by the Certificate Coordinator

- COMPSCI 162 Computer Applications
- COMPSCI 171 Introduction to Programming
- 4) Acquire <u>6 or more points</u> through participation at technology-themed events either on or off-campus or other approved co-curricular activity. A list of potential activities with related point value will be provided on a semester basis.
- 5) Complete a final <u>reflective capstone</u> activity.

All work will be compiled in an ePortfolio and assessed by the certificate coordinator.

Students who successfully complete the DML Certificate will receive a transcript designation Digital Media and Learning Certificate.

Master in Social Work Proposal

The Master of Social Work degree is a professional degree which prepares students through the development of advanced generalist skills for clinical practice with individuals, families, groups, organizations and communities within diverse systems and settings. Students graduate from our program as clinicians, group facilitators, supervisors, advocates, and researchers. In addition, the master's program in social work at UW-Whitewater prepares students for specialized practice with physical disabilities, military and/or addictions.

The Council on Social Work Education requires that accredited social work programs have specializations. Specialized practice augments and extends social work knowledge, values, and skills to engage, assess, intervene, and evaluate within an area of specialization. Specialized practitioners advocate with and on behalf of clients and constituencies in their area of specialized practice. Specialized practitioners synthesize and employ a broad range of interdisciplinary and

multidisciplinary knowledge and skills based on scientific inquiry and best practices, and consistent with social work values. Specialized practitioners engage in and conduct research to inform and improve practice, policy, and service delivery. The University of Wisconsin Whitewater Master's program will have the following specializations: Substance Use/Addictions, Military and Physical Disabilities.
