The obsessive-compulsive disorder of hoarding is a branch of obsessive-compulsive disorders that has not been heavily researched. Through my own experiences with family member's that are at different degrees of hoarding, I have noticed that resources and knowledge for the understanding of this disorder is limited. "By one estimate, one third of adults in the United States collect something, and two thirds of all households have at least one collector in residence" (Frost, 2010). This disorder is widely suffered by people in The United States and needs to retain a better understanding.

I will research the attachment, accumulation, and meaning of objects non-hoarders would typically discard. I will investigate this by going through the routine of a hoarder through artistic processes. I will make three large drawings of spaces within a home. I will then make small drawings and paintings of specific items and sew them onto the surface of the room space. This stacking of objects is a way hoarders spatially organize space that non-hoarders do not completely understand. Also when submerging myself into this process I will mentally be attaching myself to each drawing and painting and therefore be mentally attaching myself to each specific object. During the process of sewing the smaller drawings and paintings onto the surface of the larger drawing I will also become spatially attached to where items belong. Through my investigation I will be documenting the feelings and stories behind the objects and record them physically onto the surface of the drawing itself. By researching this disorder visually I will be able to bring understanding to the mentality and process of this obsessive-combustive disorder. Along side of my research of hoarding I will also be researching the methods of research-led artistic practices by dissecting the book Art practice as Research by Graeme Sullivan with my mentor.

The goals and outcomes seem disconnected because the goal, as it is stated, is to understand and organize space like a "hoarder" when the outcome is actually a conceptual representation of those acts. The researcher may be able to project an emotion through the drawings and document her understanding of it. Maybe, it would be a better project, if it were clear that the goal is not a universal understanding, but rather an individual pursuit that will add to greater dialogue of art/theory surrounding this subject.

Evaluation:
