B. Announcements:

-CourseLeaf to be closed (can view only) 2/18/19 - 2/22/19, however it may open as early as Wed. 2/20/19. Therefore, the proposal due date for the next meeting is extended out to Mon., Feb 25.

-Gen Ed Recertifications: The good news is that no course will lose its designation in the Fall. It was written into the process that there would be a transition period. The official deadline was in January but GERC has continued to review proposals. At this point, GERC has sent approximately 21 proposals back to proposers for revision and there are probably at least 2 dozen current Gen Ed elective courses that have still not been submitted for either recertification or decertification. CCC reps are asked to review their course inventories. GERC will continue to review recertification requests at their March and April meetings.

Therefore, the March 13, 2019 deadline for Winterim, Spring & Summer 2020 proposals is also the final deadline for Recertifications.
