# **Discover Your Library!**

**he scene:** You are enrolled in Global Perspectives for the Fall 2014 semester, and you have just been assigned a 5-6 page research paper. Your topic: Islamic cultures in the Middle East. You need to use both books and journal articles as sources for this paper. Online information from the general Web (e.g., Web sites found through Google, Bing, etc.) is not allowed.

#### So, How Do I Look Up a Book?

To help you get started on your paper, your professor suggests a book you might use. The title is *Islam without Illusions: Its Past, Its Present, and Its Challenge for the Future.* To find the book, search Research@UWW as outlined below.

- 1. Start on the Library's home page (http://library.uww.edu/).
- 2. There is a search box in the middle of the home page. Make sure the **Research@UWW** tab above it is selected.

Research@UWW can also be used to search for articles!

- In the drop down menu near the search box, choose Books, Media, & More (UW Whitewater).
- 4. Type the **title** of the book you are looking for (see above) in the **search box** and click **Search**.

★ After reading all of the information above and following the instructions to find the book in Research@UWW, write the book's UW Whitewater location and *complete* call number below.

Before leaving the lab to find your book, there's one last step. On your iPad open the QR Reader app and scan the QR code to the right, then **look at the Book Stack Directory** and **locate the number of the "stack"** your book is on. A stack is a set of bookshelves. There are 153 stacks on the third floor, so you definitely need that number!

### Don't Forget Journals!

During the course of your research, you found reference to an article entitled "Religious Orientation Types in Iranian Muslims." It was published in March 2006 in *Review of Religious Research*. To find the March issue, follow the steps as outlined below:

When citing an article in a bibliography, you need at least the author's name (if any), the article title, journal title, publication date, and page numbers. More information may be required.

- 1. **Go to the Bound Periodicals** section on the **first floor** of the Library. The Bound Periodicals are older issues of journals and magazines that are available in print.
- 2. Journals in the Bound Periodicals are arranged in **alphabetical order** by title of the journal.
- 3. Beginning in the R's, find **Review of Religious Research** on the shelf.
- 4. Choose the **2006** volume. Which volume **number** is this?
- 5. Find the March issue in this volume. Which issue number is this? \_\_\_\_\_

After reading all of the information above and following the instructions, **use your iPad to take** ★ a picture of the front cover of this specific issue (see above). Only one photo per group is needed. Show the photo to the librarian when you get back to the classroom, and have her/him initial your sheet here: \_\_\_\_\_\_
