Arts Integration 101 (all grade levels)
Facilitated by Maryanne Messier

What is arts integration? This session unpacks the Kennedy Center's definition and gives you the opportunity to uncover the characteristics of quality integration. Maryanne will walk you through the Reaching New Horizons program and prepare you



for what to expect in workshops, classroom demonstrations and beyond. In addition, the session includes your participation in an arts integrated lesson and examines how arts integrated instruction aligns with current learning principles and best practices. This workshop is recommended for anyone interested in learning more about arts integration in general and individuals who are interested in developing an arts integration team at their school. This workshop is also required for any teachers who are joining an existing arts integration school team for the 2018-2019 school year.

Singing the Words: Lyric Writing in the Classroom (grades 2-5)

Presenter – Stuart Stotts

Music is a central part of most students' lives; they listen, they sing, they dance. Teachers can use this natural affinity to motivate and engage students in the classroom. In this workshop with songwriter and author Stuart Stotts, participants explore three different song structures and patterns that students can use to write, sing, rehearse, and perform original song lyrics. This



creative process helps students demonstrate their understanding of any content area while experiencing the joy of music. No musical training is necessary; only an interest in singing is required.

Words Alive! Building Vocabulary and Stimulating Writing (Part One) (grades K-5)

This video workshop focuses on multi-sensory activities that use Commonplace Books (multi-sensory journals and annotated personal anthologies) to help students improve both their vocabularies and their writing skills.

Unravel The Mystery Of Flight: Discover The Laws Of Motion Through

Movement (grades 4-8)


Presenter – Karen McShane Hellenbrand November 29, 2018, 4-7 p.m. Kennedy Elementary School, Janesville



Using a physical experience, this workshop will help teachers increase their students' understanding of scientific laws of motion. Abstract concepts are explored while students move their bodies through space. Under the thematic umbrella "airplane", teachers will learn to create a dynamic movement pattern that

represents thrust, drag, lift, and weight. In addition, safe ways to elevate and change speeds will be taught through guided exploration. Participants will obtain skills to create similar improvisations with their students. Karen McShane-Hellenbrand, B.S. Dance Education, and M.F.A. is an educator, choreographer, and performer who artfully teaches scientific concepts through movement to illuminate flight! Words Alive! Building Vocabulary and Stimulating Writing (Part Two) (grades K-5)

This video workshop focuses on multi-sensory activities that use Word Walls (large displays of words, phrases, sentences and symbols selected by students) to help students improve both their vocabularies and their writing skills. Count the Circle, Color the Clock: Connecting Math with Art for the Visual Learner

(grades K-2)

What does it mean to count a circle or color a clock? We all learn in different ways. In this 3 hour workshop you will explore the visual connections that will have you counting a circle as you add color to a clock. Participants will practice content-connected kinesthetic activities before ending the workshop by putting all the parts together around a basic geometric shape, and leaving with strategies to help even our most struggling students become successful learners. ABOUT THE PRESENTERS...

Gee Gee Jannene has more than ten years of experience as an elementary art teacher. She uses TAB (Teaching Artistic Behavior) as a model in her classroom. Gee Gee also leads the Art Coding Club, is the STEAM site coordinator, and leads the arts integration team at her school. She has experience facilitating arts integrated units of study with elementary students, and frequently collaborates with the physical education/ health teacher at her school.

Sally Koehler is a visual artist who specializes in book making, handmade paper, collage, and concrete sculpture mosaics. She is a former elementary art teacher, and has several years of experience conducting student workshops and residencies, as well as community arts projects. She enjoys integrating visual art with history, language arts and science.

Maryanne Messier is an Art Teacher at Monroe Elementary in the School District of Janesville. She has been a TAB (Teaching Artistic Behavior) Teacher for the past decade. With over 20 years of teaching experience and 9 years of leadership experience, Maryanne fully embraces and understands what arts integration looks like in the classroom. In 2013, Maryanne was selected to represent the School District of Janesville at the Kennedy Center Partnership Conference in Washington D.C. where she received in-depth training in the arts integration methods promoted by the Kennedy Center. In spring 2015, after returning from training at The Kennedy Center, Maryanne was

appointed Arts Integration Coordinator for the School District of Janesville. As the official representative for the district in the Kennedy Center's Partners in Education Program, she serves in this role to develop and nurture arts integrated programs within the district in partnership with Young Auditorium's Education Director.

Karen Mcshane Hellenbrand has twenty-seven years of experience facilitating student residencies that integrate dance and other content areas. She is currently a professor of dance at University of Wisconsin-Madison. Karen teaches arts integration methodology at the UW-Madison. She provides professional development for teachers, and is a national presenter.

Stuart Stotts is a songwriter, storyteller, and author from Madison, Wisconsin. He has worked as a full-time performer since 1986 and gives more than 200 shows a year for kids, families, and adults around the Midwest, and sometimes farther. Mr. Stotts is a frequent presenter at conferences and workshops for teachers, parents, and librarians. He has worked extensively as an artist-in-residence in elementary, middle, and high schools. He has also released several award-winning recordings and is the author of *The Bookcase Ghost:* A Collection of Wisconsin Ghost Stories, Books in a Box: Lutie Stearns and the Traveling Libraries of Wisconsin, Curly Lambeau: Building the Green Bay Packers, and the forthcoming We Shall Overcome: A Song that Changed the World.
