### ADMINISTRATIVE EXPERIENCE

#### Interim Dean, College of Letter and Sciences, UW-Whitewater (2018-present)

Since May 2018, I have served as interim dean. I am responsible for leading the College of Letters & Sciences, a college that consists of 14 departments and two programs, approximately 275 faculty and about 4,500 students. Among my direct reports are the 14 departmental chairs, one associate dean and two assistant deans. Together we actively plan for all aspects of running this large college. These activities range from student recruitment and retention to curricular developments, to capital improvements, and to all aspects of budgetary planning. I also direct faculty recruitment, as I am involved in all aspects of faculty searches, including making initial position requests, interviewing candidates and negotiating salaries. I also evaluate the annual reviews and promotion dossiers of all faculty and academic staff in the college. In addition, I lead the Dean's Advisory Board, a group of more than 30 influential alumni who make significant intellectual and financial contributions to the college. I also work with other alumni and college benefactors on a regular basis. I also lead the Dean's Advisory Council, a group of about 15 extremely engaged students who help me keep abreast of trends and issues from a student perspective.

### **Associate Dean, College of Letter and Sciences, UW-Whitewater (2013-2018)**

As this college's only associate dean, I assisted the dean with all aspects of leading the College of Letters & Sciences at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater. This college consists of 14 departments and two programs, approximately 275 faculty and about 4,500 students. My primary responsibilities included managing all aspects of the college's \$16 million budget. This involved balancing the budget, issuing contracts, directing faculty searches, managing start-up funds, grant matches, professional development resources and travel funds. I also purchased all of the technology for the college, ranging from costly scientific equipment, to computers, printers and software for individual faculty, to complete classroom and computer lab renovations that can cost well over \$250,000. The latter requires careful strategic planning (i.e., prioritization, development and funding acquisition) to succeed. I also supervised the college's Learning Technology Support staff. This team assists with the maintenance all of the college's computers, including those used in staff offices, classrooms and labs. For four years, I served on the UW System's Learn@UW Executive Committee, a group that provides vision, strategic direction, and oversight for the instructional applications and technological tools that support teaching and learning across the entire 26 campus UW System. I also served on its budget subcommittee and help manage its \$5 million budget.

Other responsibilities included chairing the college's Planning and Budget Committee and its Professional Development Committee. The latter attempts to advance faculty careers by providing both release time and resources to junior and senior colleagues attempting to either develop new projects or to finish those that are nearly complete. I also co-chaired the college's assessment committee and served on several university-level assessment committees. Because of my familiarity with assessment, as well as my experience helping write an HLC reaccreditation report while at Bowling Green State University, I also served on UW-W's HLC team and helped prepare for our recent reaccreditation.

I also had a number of key responsibilities in the areas of facilities planning and infrastructure development. I worked with college chairs and directors to collect and compile data on required building maintenance in both research and teaching facilities. I also served as the faculty liaison for the Student Success Center (SSC), a \$4.5 million addition to Laurentide Hall, where I served as the building supervisor. In addition, I served as the college's representative on other university-level facilities committees, including the Executive and Advisory Planning Committees.

I was also a leader of the university-level Inclusive Excellence Committee, a committee that supports equity, diversity, inclusion, and global perspectives at UW-W through various activities. For example, each year we award four post-doctoral fellowships to recent PhDs from underrepresented groups. For the past two years, I chaired this committee and led these searches. I also led the effort to create the new Department of Computer Science and assisted with the creation the Computer Science MS program and the Social Work MSW. I also worked with the Center for Global Education to create exchange programs with several Brazilian universities and I helped create a course that took a class to the Paralympic Games in Rio de Janeiro in August, 2016. I was also actively involved in various development efforts and related initiatives such as assisting the dean with the Dean's Advisory Board, a group of influential alumni who make significant intellectual and financial contributions to the college. In addition, for five years I managed the UW-W Science Outreach staff and directed this program.

### **Associate Dean, College of Arts and Sciences, Bowling Green State University (2009-2013)**

The College of Arts & Sciences (A&S) at Bowling Green State University (BGSU) then consisted of 32 departments and programs, approximately 500 faculty and 5,000 students. My portfolio consisted of three primary areas: faculty development, curriculum, and assessment. Within each of these areas, numerous activities were undertaken. Under the heading of faculty development, my most important duty was arguably to ensure that both tenure track and non-tenure track faculty were successful in their careers. To

assist with their professional development, I taught numerous workshops over the course of each academic year. Some of these helped faculty prepare for their annual reviews, others their third year reviews, and still others focused on the preparation of tenure and promotion dossiers. These trainings were provided not just to individual faculty members, but also to their chairs since they play such a crucial role in the development and eventual promotion of their faculty. Together with the dean, I concentrated on making the standards for tenure and promotion more consistent across departments. I also piloted a university-level project designed to allow BGSU to transition from the submission of paper promotion dossiers to digital ones. The pilot project I developed was such a success that it has since expanded to all candidates at every level across the entire university. I also worked to ensure that newly hired faculty members were properly mentored; something I believe significantly enhances their professional success and increases the probability that they will not seek employment elsewhere. As the founder and ex-officio chair of the College Diversity Committee, I also helped create and implement multiple initiatives designed to enhance the success of faculty members from underrepresented groups. These included a paired mentorship team for each faculty member, as well as several college-wide diversity awards.

The second area on which I focused was curriculum, as all curricular modifications within the college required my review and approval. As part of this major undertaking I chaired seven content specific curriculum committees (e.g., Arts & Humanities). In a typical year hundreds of modifications were made, scores of new courses created, and several programs reshaped from top to bottom. Highlights of these activities include the creation of an innovative, 100 percent, on-line degree program, the B.S. in Fire Administration (FIAD). This program was designed for non-traditional, fee-paying professional firefighters. After an extensive review at multiple levels, including the Ohio Board of Regents, our proposal was approved in spring 2011. The first FIAD cohort began in fall 2012. This program, which increased both enrollment and revenue, has been extremely successful. I also worked on other creative projects specifically designed to reduce costs and strengthen programs. More specifically, I took the lead on establishing the School of Cultural and Critical Studies (SCCS) within the college as a way to bring together like-minded departments while also reducing overhead and other related expenses. Specifically, I played a key role in merging the Departments of American Culture Studies, Ethnic Studies, Popular Culture, and Women's Studies into the SCCS. I also served on the university's Undergraduate Council (UGC). The UGC is responsible for formulating all academic policies relating to undergraduate education. I chaired the UGC sub-committee on dual enrollment (i.e., programs where high school students earn college credits while still attending high school). Our subcommittee recommendations were approved by UGC and later endorsed by the BGSU president. I also served on the Bowling Green Perspective Committee, the committee responsible for approving and assessing all undergraduate general education courses. Finally, for three years I served as a core member of the committee charged with completely restructuring general education at BGSU. As part of the first phase of this project, I assisted A&S units create more than 25 pedagogically innovative inquiry courses.

Assessment is the third major area in which I worked while associate dean. I took the lead in all areas of college assessment. I provided assessment workshops to chairs and other interested faculty, I reviewed and commented on the annual assessment reports that each A&S unit must complete, and I served on the university's assessment committee, serving one term as the elected chair of this committee. As a leader in the area of assessment at BGSU, I was part of the university-wide team that prepared the assurance argument report for the Higher Learning Commission's 2013 reaccreditation of BGSU.

I also performed a variety of other duties during this time that are too numerous to mention here. One of these was serving four years as the de facto director of the interdisciplinary Canadian Studies Program. This program consisted of two dozen faculty members and also offered a minor in Canadian Studies. In this position I organized and directed the annual Reddin Symposium, an event focused on Canadian issues that typically attracted about 200 community members and faculty. I also worked closely with the

Reddin family, donors whose generosity made this event possible. As the dean's representative, I also interviewed dozens of candidates for faculty positions.

**Acting Associate Dean, College of Arts and Sciences (2008-2009)**

My duties at this time were essentially the same ones that I undertook as associate dean for the next four years.

**Director of Demographic Studies (1997-2007)**

During my tenure as the Director of Demographic Studies (DDS) I worked to improve the quality of our graduate and undergraduate demography programs and to enhance their national and international visibility. To initiate this process, I attempted to recruit the best possible students to the program. This meant recruiting at both national and international conferences. It also meant lobbying higher administration for enhanced stipends to fund these students. In addition, I created a BA minor degree in Demographic Studies making BGSU one of only three programs nationwide to then offer such a degree program. I also assumed an active professional role by serving as the Director of the 10<sup>th</sup> Biennial International Applied Demography Conference; a 1997 conference attended by more than 200 scholars from around the globe. I also served as Conference Co-Director for the 1999 Meetings of the Southern Demographic Association; a conference attended by over 500 scholars. In 1998, three of my fellow BGSU demographers and I founded the Center for Family and Demographic Research (CFDR). This research center has continued to grow in national and international prominence such that in 2000 it became a federally funded, National Institutes of Health (NIH) population studies center. Since then, the CFDR has received multiple renewal awards and millions of dollars from the NIH. Less than 25 universities have similar NIH funded population centers. Part of the success of this center has been its ability to hire promising faculty members. During my time as DDS I chaired seven search committees for junior faculty and one for a senior faculty member. I also met with donors and was instrumental in the creation of the Adamchak Graduate Student Award in Demography, the first endowed award in the Department of Sociology. This annual award is given to the most promising student in the area of demographic studies. Even after joining the Dean's Office, I continued to serve as the facilitator of this award and as a member of the CFDR executive committee; a position I maintained from the CFDR's creation until my departure to UW-W. In collaboration with my colleagues, I also always planned, scheduled and staffed all demography course offerings.

**Associate Chair, Department of Sociology (1995-2001)**

As the Associate Chair, I assisted the Chair with all of the duties related to leading a department that at the time consisted of 16 tenure track and five non-tenure track faculty. In addition, for at least a month each year I served as Acting Chair. The key responsibilities I filled in this role included scheduling classes and determining merit pay. The department budget at the time was approximately \$1.4 million.

**Director of Graduate Studies, Department of Sociology (1995-2001)**

As the Director of Graduate Studies (DGS) my first goal was to improve the quality of the graduate students and the reputation of this graduate program. My initial focus was to find ways to increase the number of applications to our graduate program. For this to occur, we greatly expanded our recruitment efforts in various ways. First, our mailing list grew from several hundred to several thousand. In addition, I annually attended several national conferences where I personally met with potential applicants. Numerous other strategies were employed such that both the quality and quantity of students continued to increase. Over the course of my tenure, the mean GRE score of students admitted increased by more than 200 points. Also, the number of funded students increased as I was able to solicit and receive additional funding from both the Provost and the Dean of the Graduate College. When my term as DGS ended, there were over 50 graduate students in the Department of Sociology. As DGS, I was responsible for assigning RAs and TAs to the department's faculty, as well as scheduling all graduate-level courses. In addition, I served as the faculty advisor to all first year graduate students. I also was responsible for balancing all

aspects of the graduate student budget. Finally, as DGS I created and implemented the graduate student recruitment weekend. During these weekends, we would fund the most promising 10-12 graduate student applicants to travel to BGSU and visit for three days. Their time with us was highly structured but also complete with many opportunities for social interaction. This annual recruitment event proved to be so successful that it has continued ever since. During my time as DGS, I also served on Graduate Council, the body responsible for leading graduate education at BGSU and for formulating all policy related to graduate students. Today this doctoral program is ranked in the top 20 nationally by the National Research Council. Prior to my directorship rankings were as low as 175.

### **Rockefeller Foundation Post-Doctoral Social Science Fellow (1987-1989)**

As a newly minted Ph.D., the Rockefeller Foundation provided me with the opportunity to spend two years as a Visiting Professor at the Federal University of Minas Gerais (UFMG), located in Belo Horizonte, Brazil. While there, I was able to direct major research undertakings that entailed leading fieldwork projects in some of Brazil's most remote regions. My first undertaking was in the Amazonian state of Rondônia, where for six weeks I served as the field director of a staff of 25 interviewers collecting data on internal migration and the spread of malaria. My next fieldwork endeavor was a study of circular labor migration and regional development in one of Brazil's poorest regions, the Jequitinhonha Valley. For this project, I wrote the proposals that obtained funding from the Brazilian Ministry of Labor, the Minas Gerais Department of Labor, and the Brazilian equivalent of the National Science Foundation (CNPq). In addition, I hired and trained my own team of 24 interviewers to help me collect data from 800 households in this extremely challenging and remote region. I was responsible for all project budgets, organizing daily data collection tasks for all interviewers and six drivers, as well as handling all operational logistics for the three weeks that the entire team was in the field. Upon completion of the fieldwork, I supervised and trained a new research team on all aspects of project related data transcription, coding and entry. I also was the leader of other two other data collection projects that were slightly smaller in scale but that both required weeks of fieldwork followed by data coding and entry. These opportunities enabled me to grow as a leader and to acquire administrative and organizational skills that have helped me throughout my career. The data generated by these projects have resulted in nearly a dozen M.S. theses written at the UFMG, scores of papers presented at national and international conferences, as well as more than a dozen journal articles published in refereed journals.

## **TEACHING EXPERIENCE**

### **Classes Taught**

At Bowling Green State University, I regularly taught multiple undergraduate courses (e.g., *Introductory Statistics* taught 40 times) as well as numerous graduate courses ranging from the *Market Demography Seminar* to *Statistical Techniques & Applications in Sociology*. I also was invited to teach multiple seminars (in Portuguese) to students in the Demography Ph.D. programs at the Federal University of Minas Gerais in Belo Horizonte, Brazil and the Pontificada Universidade Católica in São Paulo, Brazil.

### **Thesis & Dissertation Committee Service**

I have served as the chair on more than one dozen thesis and dissertation committees. I also served as a member on more than two dozen other committees.

### **Curriculum Development (selected examples)**

2008-13 As the associate dean for curriculum in the College of Arts & Sciences at BGSU I helped with the creation and modification of about 1,000 courses and scores of complete program revisions. In addition, I helped create one-half dozen minor degree programs including *International Studies* and *Chinese*. I also helped create the B.S. in *Fire Administration*, a 100%, on-line degree program, designed for non-traditional, fee-paying professional firefighters. As part of BGSU's general

- education restructuring, I helped college units create more than 25 pedagogically innovative courses.
- 2001 Developed the interdisciplinary undergraduate minor *Demographic Studies*. This unique minor provides students with rigorous training in the area of population studies.
- 2000 Directed the refocusing of the sociology graduate program to include four focal areas. As a consequence, degree requirements in all areas were also restructured. Today this successful doctoral program is ranked in the top 20 nationally by the National Research Council.
