She says she loves to cook and, on any given day, family or friends stop by at mealtime. She is always happy to provide a good meal. When traveling, she and Scot have a preference for destinations with beach access. For a number of years, they enjoyed vacationing at Melbourne Beach, Florida. Lately, they have found a new favorite place – Zihuatanejo, Mexico (a little fishing village a couple of hundred miles north of Acapulco).

A Student Status Examiner Senior, Jody is one of only four individuals with that status on campus. Her duties incorporate graduation records, evaluating student records and advising students about their graduation status. Jody is also responsible for the hiring and supervision of all student employees for the Dean's offices. She assists Dr. Elizabeth Hachten, the Assistant Dean in L&S, with advising and various projects. Jody's duties involve a great deal of computer work and verification of records, but she finds it very rewarding – helping to find answers for the students and faculty.

What does she like about UWW? She likes the smaller campus and the support she receives from faculty and staff. She lives in Fort Atkinson and is happy to have a short commute.
