Tom is a journey electrician for UW-Whitewater and he manages all new construction and technical layouts on campus. Usually, other contractors are in the new buildings until completion. Then, there is more personalized work that needs to be done to meet individual needs within a particular building. Following the remodel of the University Center and the construction of Hyland Hall, Tom and his crew went in and worked on requests from individuals and offices/departments. He supervises seven LTE electricians. They handle the academic and administrative buildings on campus. There is a separate electrician for the residence halls.
