FUN FACTS: In the first two weeks of February, UWWPD had over 60 calls to jumpstart vehicles on campus.

Tips to start your car in cold weather:

- 1. Turn off everything (radio, heater, defroster, headlights and windshield wipers) to let your battery focus on starting your vehicle.
- 2. Turn the key and hold it for about 10 seconds. If it doesn't start, let it rest a few minutes and try again.
- 3. If it doesn't start after a few tries, jumping the battery may help, but depending on the age of the battery a replacement might be necessary.

Reminder: UWWPD offers this service for free, but emergency/urgent calls take priority. Additionally, jumpstart services are only offered on campus.

CPR PROGRAM UPDATES:


Despite the COVID-19 Pandemic, UWWPD continues to safely certify students and employees of UW-Whitewater in CPR and AED usage. This service is free of charge.



- Don't allow technology to make you unaware of your surroundings It is easy to lose awareness when your headphones are in and you are scrolling through your phone. The key to getting out of a potentially dangerous situation is to recognize it as such.
- 2. Know your way around campus and other areas you frequent In addition to being aware of your surroundings, you should know your surroundings as well. Take time to be familiar with landmarks so that you can navigate around or out of an area, should you need to.
- 3. Never walk alone at night If you do not have another person that can accompany you, you can call UWWPD at 262-472-4660 to request an escort on campus.

If you are looking to plan a UWW event during the COVID-19 pandemic, you might be wondering where to start. Check out the below information and blue links for some tips!

The first resource you will need is the Event Policy and Exception Protocol document. The Event Policy and Exception Protocol defines events, meetings and gatherings, and also outlines when an exception request needs to be submitted. Most commonly, this is when someone would like to have an event with over 25 people, or if an exception is being requested to any procedures outlined in the Warhawks Return Practices.

If your event will require an exception, you will need to fill out an Exception Request Form. A detailed outline and safety plan will be submitted along with the Exception Request Form, describing how you plan to hold your event safely. See the request form for more details on what to include in your safety plan and outline!

You are not required to submit an exception request to have food at your event. Just make sure to follow the Guidelines for Food at Events, Meetings or Gatherings during COVID-19.

UWWPD in Action: UWWPD Wears Denim to Support Survivors and Raise Awareness of Sexual Violence

Italy, 1992.

An 18 year old girl is raped. She reports the crime and the rapist is arrested and sent to jail.

Years later, his conviction is overturned on the grounds that because the victim was wearing tight jeans, she had to help remove them, and by removing her jeans she implied consent.

The women of the Italian Parliament launched a protest wearing jeans on the steps of the Supreme Court. International media picked it up, and the first US **Denim Day** was held in Los Angeles in April of 1999.

April was Sexual Assault Awareness Month.



UWWPD in Action: Emergency Vehicle Operations and Control (EVOC) Training

UWWPD and the City of Whitewater Police Department held joint EVOC instruction in May, utilizing the Jefferson County Speedway for their course.

EVOC training instructs and teaches first responders the necessary skills to operate an emergency vehicle safely.

Some areas trained include review of:

- The departments' individual pursuit policies
- Basic EVOC skills on the driving course
- Steps for conducting a high-risk traffic stop at the end of a pursuit
- Steps for conducting pursuits that end in a parking lot between vehicles
- Pursuits with two subjects in the vehicle
- Pursuits where Stop Sticks are deployed.

UWWPD in Action:

Defense and Arrest Tactics (DAAT) Training

UWWPD and the City of Whitewater Police Department held joint DAAT instruction in June.

Voluntary compliance is always preferable to having to use a physical intervention, however DAAT training instructs and teaches police what to do in situations where efforts of an officer to gain voluntary compliance do not work. Wisconsin's DAAT system is defined as "a system of verbalization skills coupled with physical alternatives." This definition reflects the goal of gaining voluntary compliance.

Some areas trained include review of:

- How to achieve and maintain control of resistive subjects
- How to detain persons reasonably suspected of criminal behavior
- How to make lawful arrests
- How to defend themselves or others
- How to prevent escape

UW System has announced that COVID-19 vaccinated students who attend universities that achieve at least 70 percent vaccination rates by October 15th, 2021 will be eligible to win one of 70 scholarships valued at \$7,000 each.

Additionally, starting in August, UW-Whitewater will give 10 vaccinated students \$500 awards through a weekly drawing.



Detective Servi and Officer Nic Thompson of UWWPD are trained instructors for the International Police Mountain Bike Association (IPMBA). IPMBA is a nonprofit educational organization that provides resources, networking opportunities, and training for public safety cyclists. Example courses include police, EMS and security personnel.

Each summer, UWWPD and the City of Whitewater Police Department host police bike training in Whitewater. Typically they hold multiple sessions that last about a week. Some areas trained are patrol procedures, tactics, night operations, scenarios, basic bike maintenance and on-the-road repairs.

Bike usage is important for public safety because responders can move more easily on bikes than in cars in congested areas. Bicycle use also promotes good health and is environmentally friendly.

On the UW-Whitewater campus, bikes are often used by UWWPD for patrol, as they can be operated on streets, sidewalks, trails, and other areas that are difficult to acess with motor vehicles.

UWWPD personnel take part in Fairhaven Senior Service's Cycling Without Age program. Twice a month members of UWWPD serve as "pilots", utilizing trishaw bikes owned by Fairhaven to give residents a ride around town.

Trishaws are pedal-assisted cargo bikes on three wheels that can fit one to two passengers. They have seatbelts and all pilots are trained in safety.

Cycling Without Age was developed in 2012 in Copenhagen, Denmark. Since then, it is represented in 51 countries with approximately 1.9 million people served.

UWWPD in Action

In 2021, UWWPD was able to purchase two e-bikes for our department using money generated from the International Police Mountain Bike Association (IPMBA) courses taught by UWWPD IPMBA instructors.

These electric assisted bycicles were a great addition to the UWWPD bike patrol program. Bike patrol allows our officers to serve the campus community in a more personal, proactive way.



- 1. **Follow the laws.** Halloween is a time for fun, but laws still apply. Do not drink alcohol if you are not over the legal drinking age. Do not drink and drive, or accept a ride from someone who has been drinking.
- Watch what you are drinking. This goes for alcoholic and non-alcoholic beverages. Try to always open or mix your own drink, and do not leave your drink unattended.
- 3. Choose your costume wisely. Choose a costume that allows free movement. Example: High heels can impact safe walking and may not be practical if you will be walking for long distances.
- 4. Go with a group and stay with your group. Make sure your group has people you trust. Agree to arrive together and leave together.
- 5. **Keep track of your phone and have your battery fully charged**. Turn on your phone's volume and vibration in case someone tries to reach you. Your phone will be a much needed resource if you end up needing to call someone for a ride.

It is important to trust your instincts. If something does not feel right or makes you feel uncomfortable, trust that feeling and try to remove yourself and your group from the situation. If you find yourself in an emergency situation where you need help, call 911.

<u>Drive safely this holiday season, Warhawks!</u>

During the national <u>"Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over"</u> campaign this holiday season, law enforcement agencies across Wisconsin, including UWWPD, will boost patrols to watch out for impaired drivers. The mission of this campaign is to enhance public safety and discourage people from driving while intoxicated.

Just the facts:

- Someone is injured or killed in an alcohol-related crash about every three hours in Wisconsin.
- In 2020, there were 6,050 alcohol-related crashes in Wisconsin, killing 167 people. Additionally, alcohol was involved in over one-quarter of all traffic fatalities.
- In 2020, there were 2,250 crashes in Wisconsin involving drugged drivers, killing 80 people.

Things to remember:

- You can be arrested for operating while intoxicated even if your blood alcohol content is below 0.08, if it is determined your level of impairment prevents you from safely operating a motor vehicle.
- In Wisconsin, drivers under age 21 are prohibited from having any detectable amount of alcohol in their system.
- All drivers are prohibited from having any detectable amount of illegal drugs in their system.

Celebrate responsibly!

- Identify a sober designated driver before celebrating this holiday season.
- Use other options if a sober driver is not available; taxi, rideshare service, or call a sober friend for a ride.
