Our Institute’s research reaches a wider audience

In an earlier issue of this newsletter, we told you about the work of Dr. Ruth Hansen and her colleague, Dr. Lauren Dula (Binghamton University, SUNY) in receiving the inaugural Bill Levis Research Award from the Association of Fundraising Professionals. The research results are in and will be presented at AFP’s ICON Conference in May, 2022 in Las Vegas, NV. “*Know the audience you’re writing to,*” Dula says. “*Don’t assume that your women are going to be more community-minded than your men. They might respect or respond better to messages of close networks and risk reduction too.*” (Successful Fundraising, March 2022, Vol.30, No.3)

UW-W’s [Institute for Nonprofit Management Studies](#) is nationally recognized for its research on nonprofit management studies programs offered in higher education across the USA and the supporting structures that make these programs possible. An upcoming publication completes this research series, Weber, P., & Brunt, C. (2022), “Building nonprofit management education in the US: The role of centers in supporting new academic disciplines”, *Journal of Public and Nonprofit Affairs*, 8(1), 1–26.

In collaboration with the Helen Bader Institute (UW-M), we’ve just released Wisconsin’s first Nonprofit Compensation & Benefits Report providing nonprofits with valuable compensation and benefits data to inform critical decisions.
