#### 4. Description of strategies used to achieve goal, if applicable:

The mathematics program relies on numerous college and university programs to meet enrollment goals. The university has the Assistant Vice Chancellor for Enrollment and Retention who heads up outreach and retention for students in the university and thus our program. In addition, the university has the University Marketing and Media Relations office which markets university programs, such as mathematics, to potential students. In addition, the college has Recruitment and Retention Programs including the Future Teacher Program and the Minority Teacher Preparation Program. The College hired a Recruitment and Retention Program Advisor who attends and hosts regional events to promote our programs. The Office of Field Experience places student teachers and field study students in middle and high schools around the area that our university serves. This contact allows regional middle and high school students to become aware of the UWW Secondary Math Education Program. In addition, the college recently made significant changes to our program's admission and completion requirements after the options were made available through DPI; these changes are expected to increase enrollment and successful completion. Our program faculty and staff support outreach programs provided by the above, such as attending the College Connections and the Warhawk Ready Programs to provide information about Secondary Math Education.

There are numerous external factors that affect program participation such as salary, work conditions, union strength, etc. Overall, the state has seen a decline in participation in teacher preparation programs. The best ways to improve performance in meeting enrollment goals are to address these conditions by improving teacher salary, work conditions, union strength, perceptions of teachers, etc. to make teaching a more desirable profession. The state should look at all options such as increasing funding for schools (and teachers), providing options or reversal to Act 10 (state law in WI), and more. Individual programs preparing teachers in shortage areas cannot be expected to indefinitely withstand the statewide trends that are products of conditions beyond the control of those individual programs. In the meantime, our program is working with the numerous university and college level outreach programs to increase awareness.
