History BSE program completers will be endorsed for licensure to teach History content courses at the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction Early Adolescence through Adolescence developmental level (approximately ages 10-21 or grades 6-12). If the student completes a licensable minor, they will be endorsed for licensure in their minor content area as well. Typically, a licensable minor will match the developmental level(s) of the major area.

Students will be required to pass additional assessments prior to student teaching and licensure.
