GENERAL EDUCATION

Gulig and Mabie frequently combine their respective classes on Environmental History and American Environmental Literature.

The UW-Whitewater general education curriculum engages students with a common core of knowledge from multiple disciplinary perspectives to hone critical thinking, communication, life-long learning and inquiry, knowledge application, and problemsolving skills. It also:

- Serves as the foundational learning experience for students throughout their college career.
- Provides the breadth of knowledge and skills to prepare students to actively respond to changing work environments, continue to learn and grow, and interact cooperatively in diverse contexts.
- Helps students develop the skills and knowledge that are needed for success in our rapidly changing, increasingly diverse and interconnected world.

The core of the general education program is a series of five multidisciplinary courses, each of which brings together material and perspectives from several disciplines so that students may understand a common body of knowledge and its interconnections. New freshmen complete the entire core curriculum. Transfer students and new freshmen enrolling with 21 or more units are assigned core courses after an evaluation of their prior coursework.

CORE 110 - World of the Arts:

This course exposes students to the areas of dance, music, theatre, and visual art. Students will gain insight into the basic components of the arts, the role of art in society, and be given an historical perspective on art. Students will attend performing arts events and experience work in the gallery context. Both western and non-western arts are explored.

CORE 120 - Historical Perspectives:

This course examines major trends in the economic, political and sociocultural history of the world since the nineteenth century. Students are encouraged to draw on multiple perspectives to develop a comparative framework for understanding the origins of current global issues and the changing role of the U.S. in the world. (Students select **either** CORE 120 **or** CORE 140.)

CORE 130 - Individual and Society:

This course critically examines how people influence and are affected by their social worlds from the perspectives of anthropology, psychology, sociology and women's studies. The course focuses on how we experience life as individuals and as members of cultural systems that shape our personalities, behavior and perceptions of the world.

CORE 140 - Global Perspectives:

This course introduces students to key terms, concepts, issues and relationships in economics, geography and political science. The course investigates how increasing globalization impacts issues such as the authority and competence of the nation-state, population growth and migration, economic development and trade and patterns of international cooperation and conflict. (Students select **either** CORE 120 **or** CORE 140.)

CORE 390 - World of Ideas:

This course examines themes and issues that have had a significant impact upon the world's civilizations. Readings will focus on primary texts representing major historical periods, world cultures and diverse perspectives. This course will stress critical and analytical thought, drawing upon knowledge obtained in this and earlier core courses. (Requires completion of English proficiency, all other CORE courses, and junior standing.)

ACADEMIC ADVISING



Students with fewer than 24 credits and students who have yet to declare a major are advised by the Academic Advising and Exploration Center.

Students with more than 24 credits are advised by advisors within their academic college or by a faculty advisor within their major.

College Academic Services and Advising Offices

The university is organized into four academic colleges on the Whitewater campus: Arts and Communication, Business and Economics, Education and Professional Studies and Letters and Sciences. Each college has an office providing extensive academic services that can:

Transferrable coursework will be posted to Stellic.

Courses not transferrable to UW-Whitewater will not appear on Stellic.

If a student has questions or would like to appeal a transfer equivalency, contact the Office of Admissions within one year of initial enrollment at UW-Whitewater. A course syllabus may be needed to aid in examination

of the course.

MILITARY CREDITS

Students who have military experience should provide an official JST, CCAF or a copy of DD 214 to be evaluated for transfer credit.

TRANSFER CREDIT AGREEMENT

Current UW-Whitewater students seeking to complete coursework elsewhere and apply toward degree requirements should complete a Transfer Credit Agreement form prior to enrolling in the course.




WHO WE SERVE

REGENT POLICY DOCUMENT 4-21

In the fall of 2017, the UW System Board of Regents adopted a policy titled "Commitment to Academic Freedom and Freedom of Expression" (RPD 4-21), which reinforced the board's commitment to academic freedom and freedom of expression and set expectations for those who violate the policy.

UW-Whitewater is fully committed to the principles of free speech, freedom of expression and academic freedom,

among many other important aspects of higher education. UW-Whitewater consistently promotes and supports student engagement and growth through the encouragement of civil discourse, open discussion, campus forums and guest speakers. We believe that freedom of expression should be protected and encouraged in a manner that promotes engagement and conversation in accordance with the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution to the fullest degree and without unnecessary constraint or fear of institutional discipline.

This policy sets forth certain rights, protections and responsibilities for our campus community regarding academic freedom and freedom of expression. UW-Whitewater may restrict expressive activity not protected by the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution or Article I of the Wisconsin Constitution. A few notable rights, protections and requirements, among others, are:

- Members of the campus community have the right to engage in speech and expression on campus and to assemble and engage in spontaneous expressive activity as long as such speech, expression or activity does not disrupt the functions of the university.
- Members of the campus community are free to criticize and contest the views expressed on campus as long as their actions do not materially and substantially disrupt the rights of others engaging in or listening to expressive activities.
- The First Amendment does not protect speech or expression that violates state or federal law, falsely defames a specific individual, constitutes a genuine threat or discriminatory harassment, sexually harasses, or unjustifiably invades substantial privacy or confidentiality interests.

As an institution of higher learning, we are all encouraged to do our part to engage in discussions, debates and conversations with others in a way that promotes civility, growth, learning and understanding of others whose ideas, opinions and beliefs may be different from our own.




The James R. Connor University Center (UC) is the heart of the UW-Whitewater campus, providing opportunities for students to enhance their college experience through a wide variety of activities and services.



The Registrar's Office supports the campus community through the following services: catalog, course schedule, registration, registration deadlines, transcripts, enrollment verifications, veteran benefit services, and the administration of university, Universities of Wisconsin, state and federal academic policies, including FERPA. Official transcript ordering, catalog, registration deadlines, graduation/commencement information, veteran's services, and policy information are located on the Registrar's Office website.

The student portal in WINS offers:

- Printable enrollment verifications
- The schedule of classes, registration, deadlines, grades and unofficial transcripts
- A place where students can confirm and update contact information, enter a preferred name, select personal pronouns, apply for graduation, and check notifications

FERPA is a federal law designed to protect the privacy of educational records. Student rights protected under FERPA are: (1) the right to inspect and review your education record; (2) the right to request an amendment to your education record; (3) the right to provide written consent; and (4) the right to file a complaint. Under FERPA, the following directory information may be made public, unless the student requests to withhold all of this information: The student's name, address, email address, telephone number (excluding cell), dates of attendance and graduation, enrollment status, program of study (college, major and minor), classification, previous institutions attended, degrees, honors and awards received, and participation in officially recognized activities and sports.

UNIVERSITY BOOKSTORE AND TEXTBOOK RENTAL



UNIVERSITY HEALTH AND COUNSELING SERVICES

The following **health services** are available for students:



GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Sometimes it may seem that college terminology is a different language. Here is a list of important terms and acronyms.

Degree Audit: A degree progress report that indicates requirements completed as well as those needing to be completed. This document matches your academic history against the program requirements of your major and/or minor.

Academic advisor: Faculty or staff member who guides students through their academic career from orientation to timely graduation in a cost-effective manner.

Adult student: A student aged 25 or older.

Asynchronous course: Courses that students do not have set mandatory scheduled meetings for. Coursework and content may be at different times and locations, but still interact through discussion boards, quizzes, and activities.

Bursar or cashier: A financial officer or treasurer of a college or university whose responsibilities include student tuition and fee accounts and overseeing the billing process.

Career advisor: A staff member who guides students with questions about career-related issues like resumés, internship and job searches, and interviews.

Canvas: An online learning platform used to deliver online courses as well as enhance face-to-face and blended courses.

Chancellor: The campus leader who is responsible for the academic, fiscal and administrative aspects of UW-Whitewater.

Class number: A unique four-digit number assigned to each course/section listed in the schedule of classes. It is the number used in the registration system to identify the course in adding, dropping or changing the grade basis.

Co-requisite or co-req: A course that must be completed prior to or during the same term as another course. For example, Biology 120 has a co-req of MATH 139, MATH 140, MATH 142 or WAIVER.

College dean: The leader of each individual college who oversees the academic, fiscal, and administrative responsibilities for their academic departments and programs.

Combined GPA: The average obtained by combining the UW-Whitewater GPA with the GPA received from any other higher education institution.

Connect 2: An app full of information related to all of the UW-Whitewater clubs, activities and student organizations.

Course offering types: The structure in which a course is instructed, such as in-person, hybrid, online, and independent study/directed research.

Credit/Unit: The terms "credit" and "unit" can be used interchangeably. Typically, courses are three credits. As a general rule, a 3-credit course meets for three hours in the classroom each week.

Cumulative GPA: The average GPA earned over time. This is obtained by dividing the total number of grade points earned by the total number of units attempted.

Dean of students: Central campus resource for addressing student concerns and advocacy.

Duo-Mobile: An app that provides multi-factor authentication (MFA) as an extra measure of security access to UW-Whitewater and Universities of Wisconsin applications. Duo-Mobile is needed whenever a Net-ID log in is required.

Email: Students access their UW-Whitewater email account by visiting uww.edu and selecting "Email" on the top navigation bar.

Emphasis: An approved set of courses within a major that defines a specialty area or specific field of study. For example, advertising is an emphasis within the journalism major.

Good academic standing: In order to remain in good academic standing at UW-Whitewater, students must have a cumulative GPA of 2.00 or above. Some colleges and/or programs may require a combined UW-Whitewater GPA above 2.00 in order to remain in good academic standing.

Handshake: An app to find on-campus and local jobs, internships, full-time jobs and information about internship and career fairs.

HawkCard: Student ID used across campus for things like entering events, residence halls, and dining areas.

Hold: A registration hold is any restriction that prevents registration. Holds can be placed on your account by various departments on campus. Many students will have an academic advising hold placed on their records; this hold is released only after completing an advising appointment. Other examples of holds include financial services and documentation.

Honors: An academic program for undergraduate students seeking a more challenging learning environment.

Learning communities: A cohort of students who take courses together and live in the same residence halls. These communities are connected to a specific faculty or staff member from their respective areas of interest to lead them through their first year of college.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Navigate: A student success platform where you can schedule advising, tutoring, career services, and other resource appointments.

Net-ID: A unique username provided to students by the university to access university technology resources such as email, Stellic, and WINS. Your Net-ID, which is also used for your email address, is provided to students when they are accepted to UW-Whitewater.

One Stop: An all-encompassing student success center offering one-on-one support for students, including success coaching, student life, financial resources, and more.

Placement exams: Tests taken to determine placement into English, math, and certain world language courses.

Prerequisite or pre-req: Requirements that need to be met before taking a particular course. For example, English 101 is a pre-req of English 102.

Provost: A campus leader who is responsible for admissions, financial aid, strategic planning, and university budget management.

Registrar: Manages the academic records for the university, including transcripts and courses.

Registration: The act of enrolling in classes, which involves choosing classes with the help of an academic advisor and submitting the course requests in your WINS account.

Satisfactory/No credit: A grade of "S" (satisfactory) will be earned if the student completes the class with the equivalent of a grade of "C" or better. A grade of "NC" will be earned if the student completes the class with the equivalent of a "C-" grade or less. Neither the "S" nor the "NC" will be included in the student's GPA. Students may take up to 15 units of satisfactory/no credit classes. Major/Minor classes cannot be taken as satisfactory/no credit. Students can only register for a class as satisfactory/no credit if the class is offered with a grading basis of "Student Option."

Section number: A number used to distinguish one class from another. One course may offer several classes or sections at various times throughout the day or week. Sections that include the letter "X" or "H" are reserved sections for select populations of students such as learning communities or the honors program and are not available to all students. Example: English 101 Section 6.

Stellic: A student course registration and degree planning tool.

Student ID number: A unique seven-digit number that identifies students in university records and when contacting various university departments. This number appears on their HawkCard.

Subject: The area or department of the course. For example, English 101 has a subject of ENGLISH.

Subsidized vs. unsubsidized loans: Federal loans offered as part of financial aid. Subsidized loans have interest paid by the U.S. Department of Education until six months after you leave school. Unsubsidized loans require students to pay interest during the entirety of the loan, including while actively a student.

Testing center: Oversees various testing programs for UW-Whitewater, including ACT/SAT and placement exam score postings used to determine exam/course credit eligibility for students.

Un-requisite or un-req: Courses for which credit cannot be earned because the content overlaps with another specified course. An example is Astronomy 101 and Astronomy 112.

Waiver: A waiver means that the student does not have to take a course; the requirement has been met with the waiver. A waiver does not result in the awarding of credit.

WINS: An online student portal network where students can register for courses, check financial records, hold information, campus profile, important dates, grades, and other helpful information.
